Sacrament of Baptism: We are excited to celebrate your child's baptism! This sacrament is celebrated on the last Sunday of each month. To have a child Baptized, one must be a registered parishioner, if new attending three months, be interviewed by Msgr. Karl Chimiak then instructed by Msgr. Karl Chimiak. The Baptism will be on the last Sunday of the month. A Godparent must be a practicing Catholic and if not from this parish must have a signed certificate from the parish where they attend.

2015 Review: We had a total of 1,136 visits to the Food Pantry in 2015. We gave out the fixings for a Thanksgiving meal to 67 families on November 21st. This included a turkey or a grocery store gift card to purchase the meat of their choice. We wish to thank our area Scout troops, the students at St. Anselm Priory, our parishioners, school parents, neighbors and friends for their awesome support and generosity. The food collection was larger than it has ever been.

The last Pantry in 2015 was on December 19th. We distributed the gifts from the Giving Tree on that day. We collected a total of 610 gifts for families and charitable organizations. A grocery store gift card was given to each family to help with holiday food needs. At the last minute, we did have to purchase some children's gifts that were not returned on time, so as to fulfill the wishes of our Pantry families. As we have said many times, this is truly a loving, caring and generous parish. God Bless All of You!!

The Sacrament of the Sick

From the Pastor

As I will very soon be giving my presentation on the Sacraments of Healing; Anointing of the sick, and Penance at our "Road to Emmaus" I thought I would give a brief overview about the Anointing of the sick as there are some who are confused with its theology before and after Vatican Council II. I have seen countless miracles from many who have been healed or given strength by this Sacrament instituted by Christ to give Grace.

The Rite of Anointing tells us **there is no need to wait until a person is at the point of death to receive the Sacrament.** A careful judgment about the serious nature of the illness is sufficient. The Sacrament may be repeated if the sick person recovers after the anointing but becomes ill once again, or if, during the same illness, the person's condition becomes more serious. A person should be anointed before surgery when a dangerous illness is the reason for the intervention (cf. Rite of Anointing, Introduction, nos. 8-10).

Moreover, "old people may be anointed if they are in weak condition even though no dangerous illness is present. Sick children may be anointed if they have sufficient use of reason to be comforted by the holy sacrament.... [The faithful] should be encouraged to ask for the anointing, and, as soon as the time for the anointing comes, to receive it with faith and devotion, not misusing the sacrament by putting it off" (Rite of Anointing, nos. 11, 12, 13).

Only bishops and priests may be ministers of the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick. A penitential rite followed by the Liturgy of the Word opens the celebration. Scripture awakens the faith of the sick and family members and friends to pray to Christ for the strength of His Holy Spirit. The priest lays his hands on the head of the sick person. He then proceeds to anoint, with the Blessed Oil of the Infirm, the forehead and hands of the sick person (in the Roman Rite). He accompanies these acts with the words, "*Through this Holy anointing may the Lord in his love and mercy help you with grace of the Holy Spirit. + May the Lord who frees you from sin + save you and raise you up*" (CCC, no. 1513).

For those who are about to depart from this life, the Church offers the person, Penance, Anointing of the Sick, and the Eucharist as "Viaticum, (food for the Journey) given at the end of life. These are the sacraments that prepare for our heavenly homeland (cf CCC, no. 1525) these rites are highly valued by Catholics as powerful aids to a Holy death. Since Holy Communion is the effective sign of Christ's Paschal Mystery, it becomes for the recipient the opportunity to unite one's own *suffering and dying to that of Christ with the hope of life eternal with him. The special words proper to Viaticum are added: "May the Lord Jesus Christ protect you and lead you to everlasting life. Amen."*

My friends, I will celebrate this sacrament any time you ask, as in the ritual itself, "*Is there any one sick among you let them call for the Priest and let them anoint them in Jesus' Name.*" The next communal anointing of the Sick at Mass will be at the 12 noon Mass, fourth Sunday of Lent, Laetare Sunday. Jesus beckons the sick and dying in Matthews Gospel, "Come to me all you who are burdened and heavy laden and I will give you rest!" Matthew 11: 28 - 30
